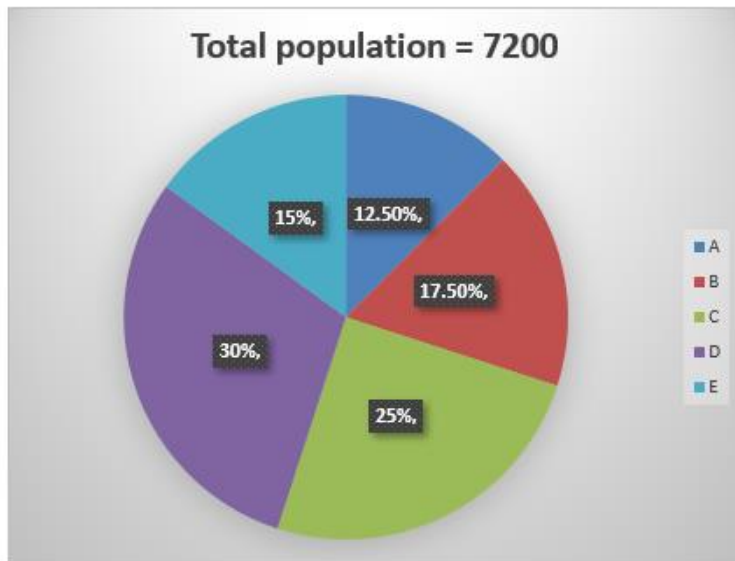

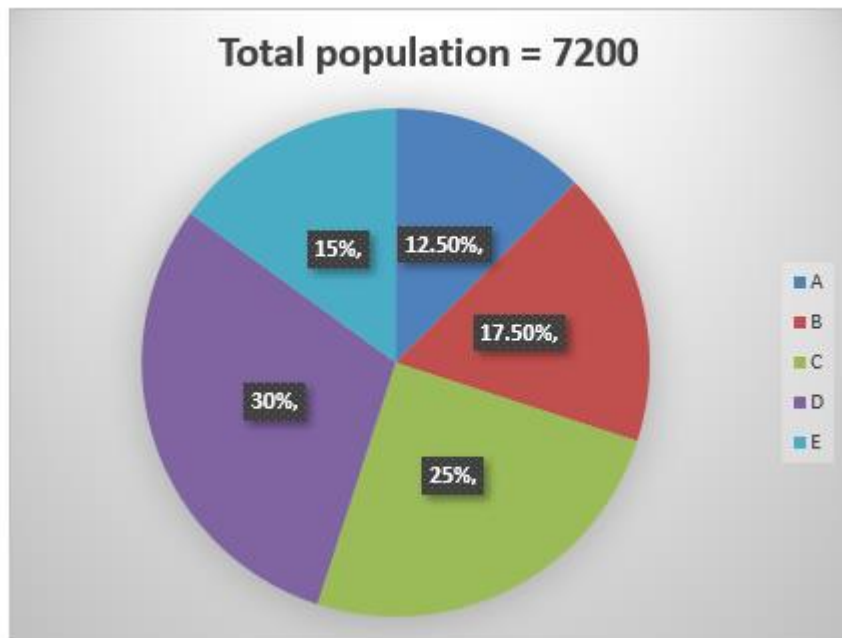
Data given below in the chart shows percentage distribution of population in five villages.

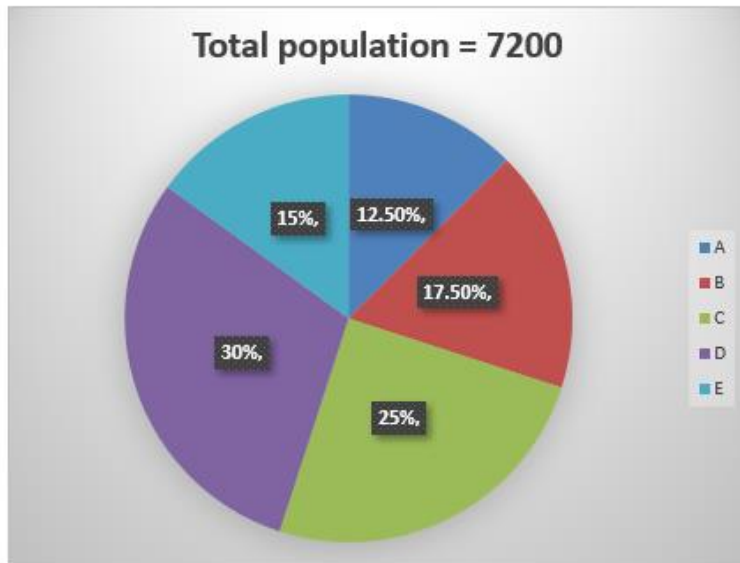

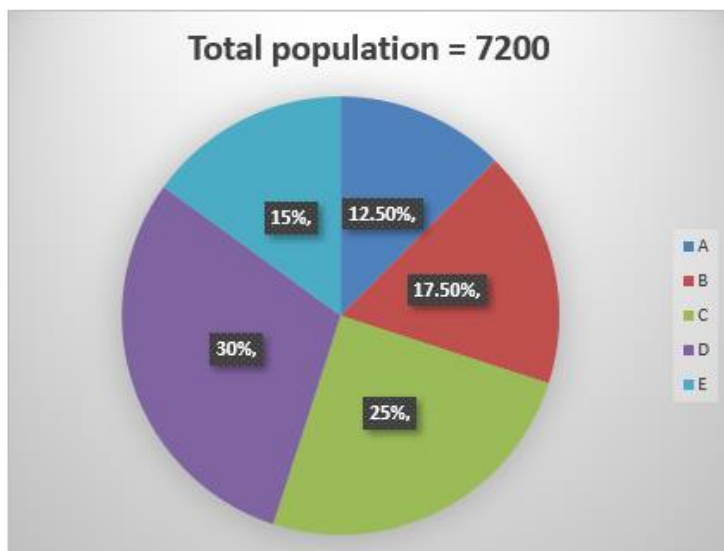

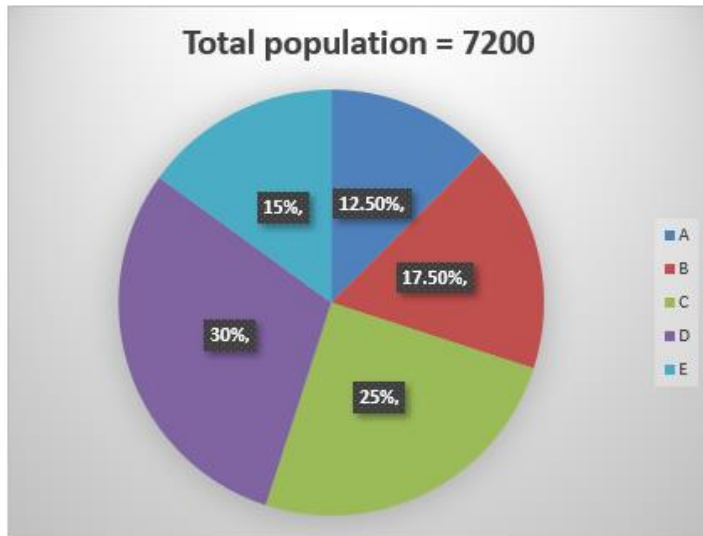
